Rev. Dr. Jin Kim, pastor of the PC(USA) Church of All Nations, Minneapolis, and Rev. Fletcher Matandika, pastor of Vancouver Associated Presbyterian Church, Vancouver, BC will be our

featured lecturers for the annual UDTs Spring Mission Conference. As a Korean pastor of a large multicultural church in the United States, and a Malawian pastor directing a world mission organization, Joy to the World Ministries, they are uniquely able to speak to the historic shifts in the global church since the Edinburgh International Mission Conference in 1910. At that first ecumenical gathering of churches (which eventually launched the World Council of Churches), 85% of the world's Christians came from the Western world. The "watchword" of the conference was "the evangelization of the world in this generation." Of the 1200 missionary delegates to the conference, only 17 were from churches in the non-Western world. Today more than 60% of the world's Christians are from the southern hemisphere. The locus of mission in the church is shifting to those who formally received missionaries. And the church is living more fully and intentionally into its unity and diversity. Jin Kim and Fletcher Matandika are representatives of these new realities in global mission. They will not only share how mission has changed over the last hundred years, but how we can be the church together in God's mission in the next hundred years.
